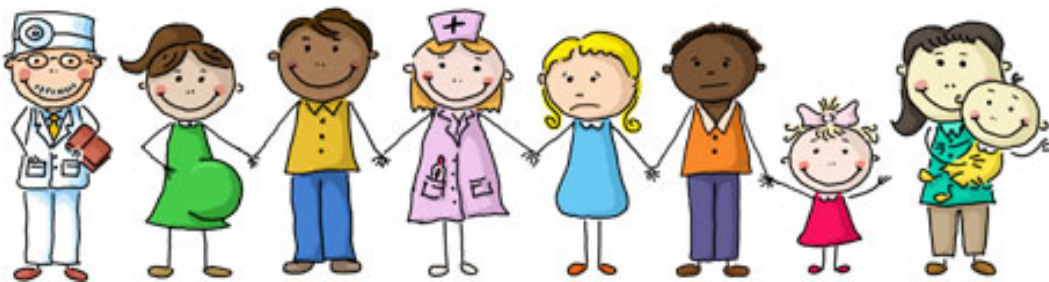

This year we have been successful in undertaking a number of initiatives including the following

- Developing a new user friendly website to enable people to easily navigate around the site and find the support and assistance they require;
- Creating a new logo which is more in line with our Sunflower Sunday to ensure that when people see a sunflower they think about CDH Australia;
- Producing our first ever CDH Australia Calendar, which will help raise money for the organisation while increasing awareness throughout the community.

The three initiatives will be launched at the 2014 Qld CAAF, which has been very capably planned and organised by Linda West and Jessica Keavney.

CDH families have again been generous with donations and volunteering. The involvement and dedication of our members encourages the Board to continue with their efforts, which can be challenging as all Directors are volunteers and have other work and family commitments.

## Who We Are

CDH Australia is a national not-for-profit support group run solely by volunteers for families, friends and medical professionals affected by Congenital Diaphragmatic Hernia (CDH).

We are a registered Health Promotion Charity with Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status. Our organisation is run by a Board of Directors and we have membership spread throughout Australia.

### CDH Australia's Mission Statement

Our Mission as a volunteer organisation is to:

1. Provide support to families affected by CDH
2. Increase awareness about CDH to impacted families and the community
3. Support and help fund research into the causes and treatments of CDH

The services and information we offer include:

- telephone support;
- a website with information, support links, photos and stories;
- information booklets;
- a regular newsletter with group updates, latest CDH news and member profiles;
- access to online forums, with one Facebook site open to the public and four set up for private use of our CDH family and chat rooms;
- parent-to-parent matching – helping families who have experienced similar CDH situations get in contact with each other;
- annual forum, held in October each year alternating between cities around Australia;
- holding an awareness day, 'Sunflower Sunday', annually.

## Values and Aims

CDH Australia exists to support anyone who faces challenges with regard to Congenital Diaphragmatic Hernia (CDH).

CDH Australia is an organisation devoted to supporting a diverse range of families affected by CDH. This includes families expecting a baby diagnosed with CDH, families caring for a child with CDH, adults with CDH and grieving families who have lost a child to CDH.

The organisation is run by volunteers and their families and friends, many of whom have experienced all facets of CDH and so understand the issues families face in their journey. Although everyone's experiences are different, the common thread that ties —CDH— allows CDH Australia to support everyone with compassion and empathy.

CDH Australia strives to build upon our partnerships with medical professionals to work together to provide CDH education, and support research into the causes and better treatments for CDH. CDH Australia facilitates knowledge sharing between families and care providers through annual forums, videos, publications and online, and we believe collaboration is an important factor for advancing service levels in care.

## Summary of Achievements 2013–2014

- New user friendly website – to make it easy for first time users to find the information they need.
- New logo – bringing the Sunflower of our Sunflower Sunday into all of media and merchandise to create a stonger link to Sunflowers and CDH. Our aim is to have Sunlowers synomonous with CDH Australia.
- Production of our first CDH Australia calendar. Through the generous donations of our supporters and families, we have been able to produce a high quality calendar which we hope will soon become a “must have” every year. This calendar will help raise much needed funds to help cover our annual administrative costs.
- We have finalised our fundraising permits across Australia which will enable us to raise funds with all valid legislative permits.
- Creating a series of five Awareness videos all available on You Tube and of course the website.
- Completing work instructions for all Director positions
- Completing fundraising guidelines for all potential fundraisers – people who want to hold a fundraiser will now have a guide on how to manage these events and donations.
- Applying and obtaining grants – two of which have been successful for assisting with the costs of running the 2014 CAAF and to develop the new website being included in the WA Genetic & Rare diseases register

Additionally we now have a permanent registered office which will save money on printing costs; moved all our files over to Google Drive to maintain our records accurately; started a new private Facebook page for extended family and friends and provided continued support to all our families when needed.

CDH Australia’s achievements can be attributed to the hard work of its volunteers and members who generously contribute their money and/or time and effort to enable our events and activities to take place.

### Fundraising Events

Every year supporters and members hold events to raise funds for CDH Australia. Without these funds we would not be able to pay for insurance and audits, other administrative costs such as publishing our booklets and sending out membership packs, and the various miscellaneous costs associated with small not-for-profit organisations. This year has been no different, with some significant amounts raised and donated to CDH Australia. The major event as mentioned previously was the “Chuckles for Cherubs” event which raised over \$12,500.00.

## CDH Research & Medical Support

There is some significant work happening in the field of research and medical support at a number of major hospitals across the country. Three current clinics are:

### 1. Royal Children’s Hospital (RCH) – Neurodevelopmental Follow-up Clinic

The Department of Neonatal Medicine at RCH has introduced this dedicated clinic for children who had surgery for CDH in the newborn period. The Clinic is staffed by paediatricians, a neuropsychologist, an occupational therapist, a speech therapist and a physiotherapist. The clinic is not designed to provide long-term therapy, but rather to assess children at specified time points and identify areas of developmental concern so that referrals can be made to appropriate community based services.

### 2. The Children’s Hospital at Westmead – CDH/Infant Lung Multidisciplinary Clinic

This is an initiative of the doctors meeting a perceived need, and children from all over Australia are welcome. Unfortunately there is no funding from the hospital as yet for staff e.g. physiotherapists or dieticians. Transport costs would need to be met by the family or assistance from state funding agencies sought.

Data exists from overseas centre that for CDH and some other chronic respiratory conditions suggests that patients are best helped by multi-disciplinary teams in large centres with the most individual and collective experience. The doctors involved have extensive experience in managing children with chronic respiratory and cardiac conditions.

### 3. Sydney Children's Hospital Randwick

Sandra Chuang is a respiratory sleep specialist who has a special interest in children with congenital diaphragmatic hernia, and has set up a CDH clinic for families who live in the area. The CDH clinic is aimed to be a multidisciplinary clinic with involvement from general paediatrician, paediatric gastroenterologist, cardiologist, surgeons, nurse, dietician, and physiotherapist as required.

Future research involving the long term outcomes of CDH babies is planned. They will keep us informed about this future research .

We now have a medical liaison officer (Danielle Kessner) who is liaising with the medical profession and will keep us informed of all medical updates and news.

### Online Support

Four private Facebook groups have now been established to allow Australian CDH parents and adult survivors to openly share their CDH experiences with each other while providing and receiving support in a more secure social networking setting than what is available in our main open group.

We have a group for bereaved parents, a group for surviving parents and adult survivors, a group for extended family and friends and a general group where all Australian CDH parents and adult survivors can join and provide support to each other as well as expectant parents. ## Highlights of 2013–2014

### CAAF – Melbourne (Oct 2013)

This 2013 CAAF was held in Melbourne, at the Royal Children’s Hospital in Parkville and at Taralye in Blackburn. Both of these venues were fantastic for our needs and were donated by their organisations for use by CDH Australia.

Day One’s medical and support forum was held in the Ella Latham Auditorium at the new Royal Children’s Hospital (RCH). The hospital is an amazing place with plenty of interesting features such as the Meer Kat exhibition and the giant aquarium. Speakers included a representative from Heartfelt, who accepted a camera kit donated by CDH Australia that has been given to Townsville Hospital. Dr Rod Hunt and Dr Ralf Heine then spoke on their latest research and current developments, followed by Lauren Mathews, executive officer from Early Childhood Intervention Australia. In the afternoon a Q&A session was held with a panel of medical practitioners.

On Day two the morning was spent remembering all our CDHer’s with some very moving tributes made. A discussion facilitated by Dr Penny Brabin was well received.
